Rising conflicts and violent organized crime persist around the world, causing immense human suffering and hampering sustainable development.

The number of forcibly displaced people reached an unprecedented 120 million in May 2024

The number of women killed in conflict increased for the first time since 2015. In 2022, 2 in 10 civilians killed in conflicts were women; 1 in 10 were children. By 2023, 4 in 10 were women, and 3 in 10 were children.

In 2023, 320 human rights defenders, journalists and trade unionists in 40 countries were killed,

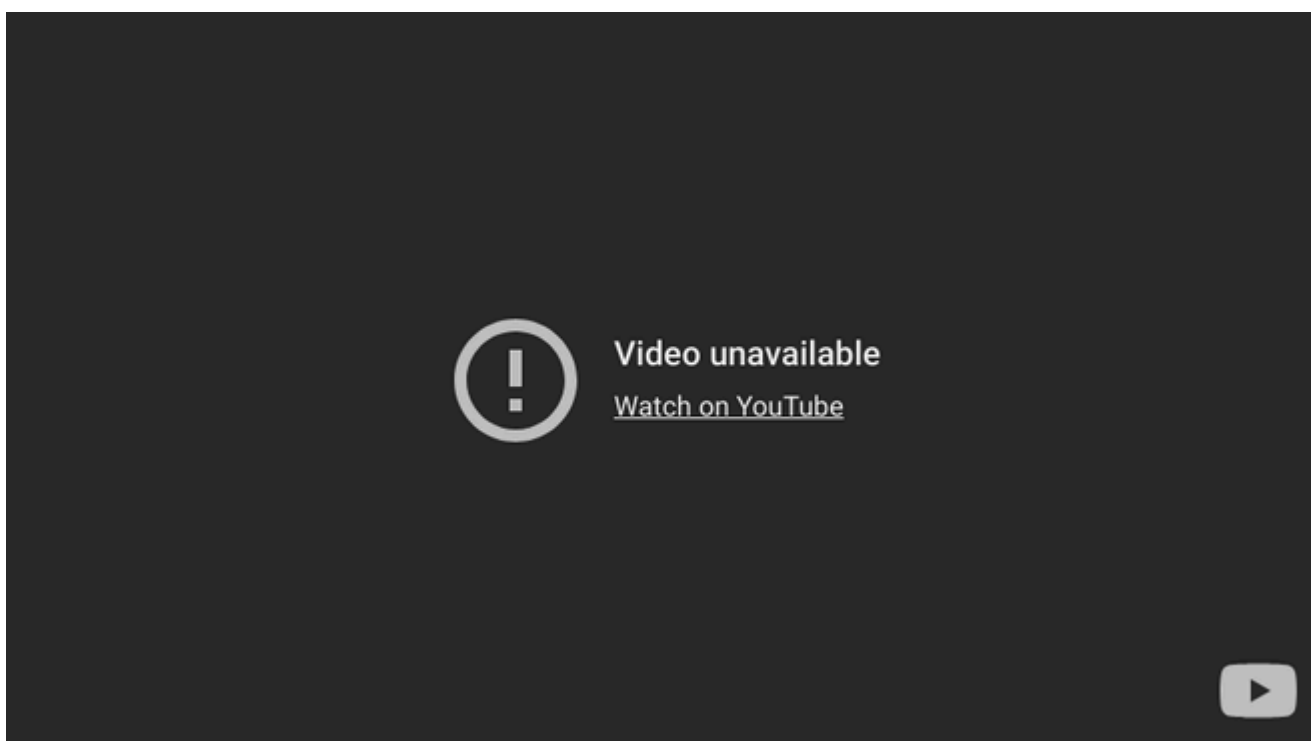

Ireland's engagement in conflict resolution and peacebuilding is grounded in our own experience of building peace and promoting reconciliation on the island of Ireland.

Ireland takes a holistic and integrated approach. We support conflict resolution and peacebuilding in our political, development and humanitarian work. We do this through the multilateral system, as well as through ongoing bilateral and civil society engagement. (IFM, 2023)

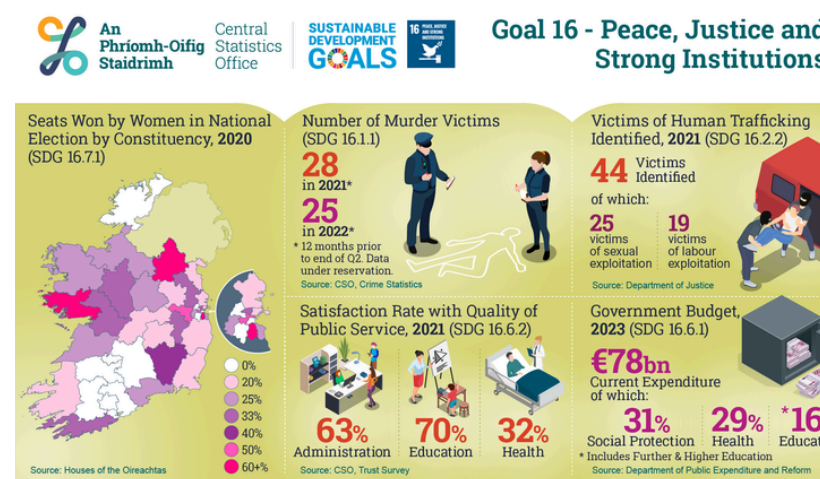


An analysis of SDG16 shows that Ireland is a relatively safe society. There are fewer deaths associated with homicide or assault and fewer perceived occurrences of crime, violence, and vandalism. Ireland's overall score is seventh relative to the EU14 countries.

Key Findings - Victims of Violence:

75 per cent of people aged 18 years and over said they felt “very safe” or “fairly safe” walking in their local area at night
This feeling of safety was considerably lower for females (64 per cent) than for males (87 per cent).

The highest rates of perceived discrimination in 2019 were reported by Persons identifying as LGBTI+ (33.2 per cent); Persons from non-white ethnic backgrounds (33.1 per cent); Unemployed people (30.2 per cent); Non-Irish nationals (26.7 per cent) and people with a disability (24.1 per cent). Challenges

Illegal logging, waste trafficking, corruption and bribery, plundering, exploitation of natural resources and poaching are examples of **GOVERNANCE AND ENFORCEMENT FAILURES**



ILLEGAL TRADE IN ANIMALS AND PLANTS - including **TIMBER AND CHARCOAL** - is a large source of **CRIMINAL EARNINGS** in the world, estimated to be worth \$50 to \$150 billion per year



Revenues generated by **ENVIRONMENTAL CRIMES** enrich international criminal cartels and **FUEL CONFLICTS** across the world



SDG16 and the Environment Connection

A better understanding of the links between **environment** and **human security** is vital for **effective conflict prevention, post-conflict reconstruction** and **promotion of peaceful and inclusive societies.**

In the past 60 years, 40 per cent of conflicts have been tied to natural resources and these are twice as likely to relapse into conflict within the first five years.

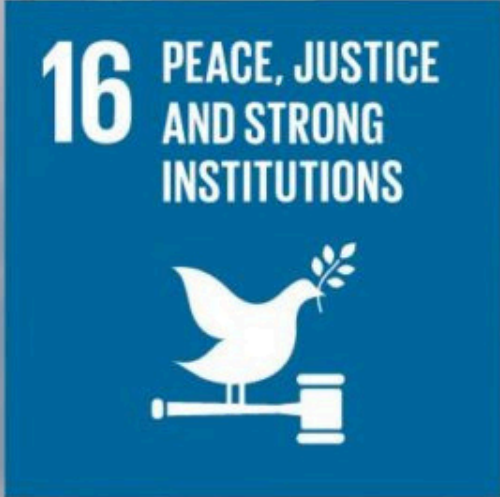
